Preschool Teaching Tips:

- I added the Boker Tov verse melody to the song.

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Preschool Teaching Tips:

- This is an easy Hinei Mah Tov for preschoolers. I sing it at Tot Shabbats and Shabbat Sings. I was delighted to discover that it's THE favorite song at my granddaughter's preschool.
- Children gives thumbs up on 'tov,' and hug themselves on 'how good it is,' or make the sign for 'good' (one hand from chin down to meet other hand, which is facing up).
- Make the sign for 'together/yachad' (fists together, circling in front of you).

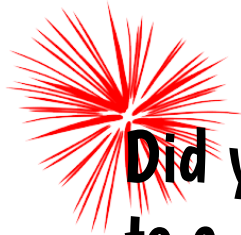


My Role...

As a Jewish **Music** Educator, I use **songs, percussion instruments, and rhythm activities** to engage children's bodies, minds, and imaginations. Through playful musical experiences, children build foundational skills while having fun.



Did you know that preschoolers who can clap to a beat learn to read more easily than peers who can't? That's because rhythm wires the brain for timing, focus, and speech — building literacy!



My Role...



I am a Jewish Music **EDUCATOR**

As a Jewish Music **Educator**, I **incorporate musical experiences that nurture cognitive and motor skills**. A wide range of songs exploring **early learning concepts** — counting, colors, seasons, animals, opposites, and more — are featured throughout the year. **Movement, props, and instrument exploration** offer

opportunities for children to build coordination, balance, and fine- and gross-motor skills. **Critical pre-reading and pre-writing skills** — crossing the midline, bilateral coordination, sequencing, sorting, and patterning — are woven naturally into the joyful music we make together.





Crossing the Midline



- **Happens anytime we cross one part of our body to the opposite side.**
- **Promotes the coordination and communication of the left and right hemispheres of the brain. [Activities that promote crossing the midline help develop vital bilateral coordination necessary for reading, writing, getting dressed, playing sports, playing instruments, self-feeding, riding a bike, tying shoes, and so much more!]**
- **Is essential for gross motor development (reaching across the body) and fine motor development (using eyes to read from left to right).**

How Music Supports Brain Development in Preschool Children

Music is a powerful, cross-domain tool for preschool children's brain development, engaging multiple senses and brain regions while fostering cognitive, emotional, and motor skills.

1. Cognitive and Language Development

Music exposure—both passive (listening) and active (singing, playing instruments)—strengthens neural pathways for language, memory, and pattern recognition. Songs with rhythm, melody, and lyrics help children recognize and manipulate speech sounds (phonological awareness), which is foundational for reading and literacy. Rhythmic patterns and repetition improve working memory and attention control, while diverse musical experiences enhance auditory discrimination and vocabulary.

2. Brain Structure and Function

Musical activities increase activation in the auditory cortex, prefrontal cortex, and motor areas, supporting executive functions like attention, problem-solving, and self-regulation. Early musical engagement can improve connectivity between brain cells, boosting memory retention, attention span, and spatial-temporal reasoning.

3. Social-Emotional Benefits

Singing and musical play strengthen emotional regulation, prosocial behavior, and bonding. Call-and-response songs and interactive instruments encourage turn-taking and communication, while soothing music helps children calm down and manage stress.

4. Motor Skill Development

Playing instruments, dancing, or fingerplay songs develops fine motor skills (e.g., hand-eye coordination) and gross motor skills (e.g., arm, leg, trunk movements). The integration of movement with music enhances coordination and body awareness.

5. Holistic Skill Integration

Music bridges intellectual, social-emotional, and motor domains, creating a "harmony between body and mind" that supports school readiness and lifelong learning. Activities like shakers, bells, or group songs combine auditory, tactile, and social engagement, making them ideal for preschool settings.



Creating an Effective Set List

- **1-3 Hello/Friendship songs – the same each week**
- **4-5 Theme songs**
 - Arrange songs sequentially so that there's a natural flow from song to song.
 - Think about the purpose each song serves. There's no need to sing multiple songs about decorating the sukkah on Sukkot, for example.
 - Songs should relate to the theme in different ways. For example, with Rosh Hashanah: apples and honey, shofar, shanah tovah, creation/birthday of the world.
 - Songs should vary in tempo (slow/fast) and dynamic (quiet/loud).
 - Songs should vary in terms of engagement — props, percussion, hand motions, and movement. Preschoolers need to move, so be sure to give them opportunities that will allow them to be successful in your music class.
 - Consider whether the song can be re-purposed later in the year for a different holiday or theme.
- **Goodbye song/routine – the same each week**
 - With my toddlers and 2's classes, I have a puppy puppet who gives kisses during a goodbye song.
 - With my 2's, 3's and PK classes, we gather in a huddle with our hands on top of one another, count to three and then 'break,' saying SHALOM!

Change lyrics to suit your curriculum needs; make it a zipper song.
- **Put down the guitar!**
Lead sign language/gestures and rhythm activities; play a recording.
- **This is my FAVORITE part of the song!**

Shabbat Sha-a-a-lom

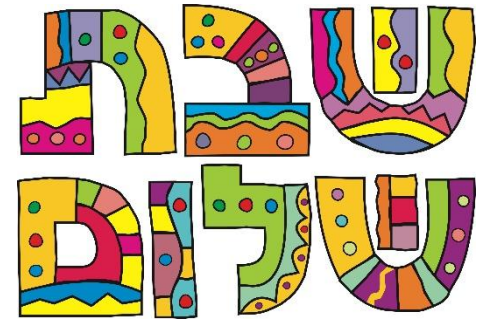

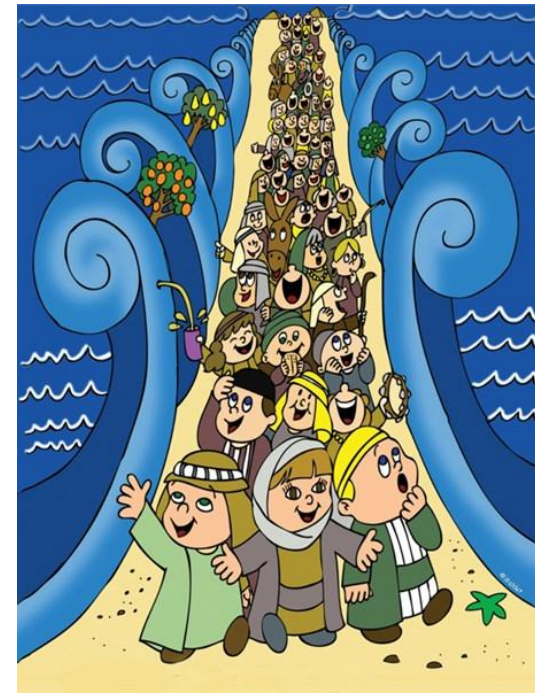

Preschool Teaching Tips:

- This is a very simple, but highly effective song, that works beautifully with 2's, 3's and PK students alike.
- Sing with two percussion instruments, such as egg shakers and tambourines, so that children can experiment with differentiation – different sounds for different words. Shake each instrument with the corresponding word and then together for 'sweet new year.' I use apple and honey-bear shakers that I made (see image above) - the children LOVE them.
- Once PK students have mastered the differentiation, practice audiating the chorus (hearing it in their heads) while doing the percussion without words. They enjoy the challenge, and then we bring back all of the words.

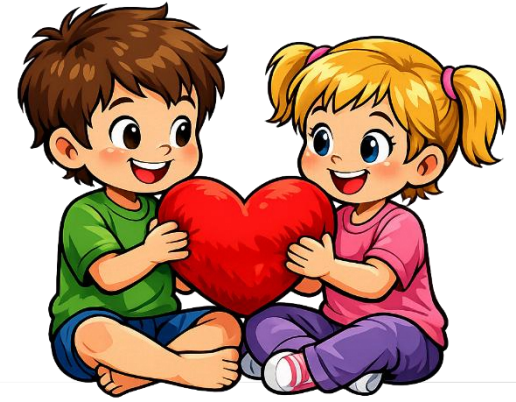

Preschool Teaching Tips:

- This is a song for Tashlich, the ceremony of throwing bread crumbs, which represent things we are sorry about, into water.
- I have used this in Yom Kippur tot services, as well as in the classroom. I use a long plastic blue tablecloth as my 'river' and the children throw pom poms or crumpled pieces of paper as their 'sorrys.'
- Tashlich can take place any time between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. I have chosen to teach about it on Yom Kippur, as there is so much to sing about on Rosh Hashanah with preschoolers.

Preschool Teaching Tips:

- I like to teach Creation and Noah in the weeks following Simchat Torah to extend the lesson about the Torah that I teach for the holiday.
- Count to three on each hand; circle hands for the ASL sign for world.
- Use hand motions for the verses.
- Put images on a felt board as the song progresses.

Preschool Teaching Tips:

- In the context of Simchat Torah, I explain that the Torah is filled with rules about how we should live. These rules are called mitzvot. One important mitzvah is to give tzedakah.
- I preface this song with a simple song about putting pennies in the tzedakah box, and give the children tzedakah shakers to fill and then shake.
- It's a good song to sing when the class collects tzedakah on Shabbat.
- Also appropriate for Shavuot, when teaching about the Torah and the Ten Commandments.

- Note: if you have more children/flames than the chanukiah will hold, they can put them all over the board because we want our flames to shine brightly in the night!

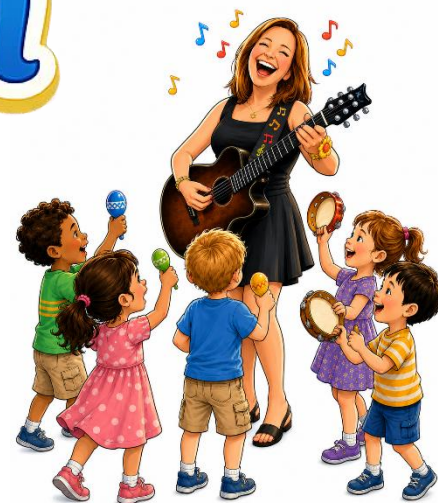

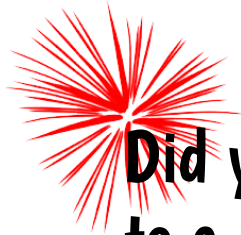

As a Jewish **Music** Educator, I use **songs, percussion instruments, and rhythm activities** to engage children's bodies, minds, and imaginations. Through playful musical experiences, children build foundational skills while having fun.



Did you know that preschoolers who can clap to a beat learn to read more easily than peers who can't? That's because rhythm wires the brain for timing, focus, and speech — building literacy!



My Role...



I am a Jewish Music **EDUCATOR**

As a Jewish Music **Educator**, I **incorporate musical experiences that nurture cognitive and motor skills**. A wide range of songs exploring **early learning concepts** — counting, colors, seasons, animals, opposites, and more — are featured throughout the year. **Movement, props, and instrument exploration** offer

opportunities for children to build coordination, balance, and fine- and gross-motor skills. **Critical pre-reading and pre-writing skills** — crossing the midline, bilateral coordination, sequencing, sorting, and patterning — are woven naturally into the joyful music we make together.





Crossing the Midline



- **Happens anytime we cross one part of our body to the opposite side.**
- **Promotes the coordination and communication of the left and right hemispheres of the brain. [Activities that promote crossing the midline help develop vital bilateral coordination necessary for reading, writing, getting dressed, playing sports, playing instruments, self-feeding, riding a bike, tying shoes, and so much more!]**
- **Is essential for gross motor development (reaching across the body) and fine motor development (using eyes to read from left to right).**

How Music Supports Brain Development in Preschool Children

Music is a powerful, cross-domain tool for preschool children's brain development, engaging multiple senses and brain regions while fostering cognitive, emotional, and motor skills.

1. Cognitive and Language Development

Music exposure—both passive (listening) and active (singing, playing instruments)—strengthens neural pathways for language, memory, and pattern recognition. Songs with rhythm, melody, and lyrics help children recognize and manipulate speech sounds (phonological awareness), which is foundational for reading and literacy. Rhythmic patterns and repetition improve working memory and attention control, while diverse musical experiences enhance auditory discrimination and vocabulary.

2. Brain Structure and Function

Musical activities increase activation in the auditory cortex, prefrontal cortex, and motor areas, supporting executive functions like attention, problem-solving, and self-regulation. Early musical engagement can improve connectivity between brain cells, boosting memory retention, attention span, and spatial-temporal reasoning.

3. Social-Emotional Benefits

Singing and musical play strengthen emotional regulation, prosocial behavior, and bonding. Call-and-response songs and interactive instruments encourage turn-taking and communication, while soothing music helps children calm down and manage stress.

4. Motor Skill Development

Playing instruments, dancing, or fingerplay songs develops fine motor skills (e.g., hand-eye coordination) and gross motor skills (e.g., arm, leg, trunk movements). The integration of movement with music enhances coordination and body awareness.

5. Holistic Skill Integration

Music bridges intellectual, social-emotional, and motor domains, creating a "harmony between body and mind" that supports school readiness and lifelong learning. Activities like shakers, bells, or group songs combine auditory, tactile, and social engagement, making them ideal for preschool settings.



Creating an Effective Set List

- **1-3 Hello/Friendship songs – the same each week**
- **4-5 Theme songs**
 - Arrange songs sequentially so that there's a natural flow from song to song.
 - Think about the purpose each song serves. There's no need to sing multiple songs about decorating the sukkah on Sukkot, for example.
 - Songs should relate to the theme in different ways. For example, with Rosh Hashanah: apples and honey, shofar, shanah tovah, creation/birthday of the world.
 - Songs should vary in tempo (slow/fast) and dynamic (quiet/loud).
 - Songs should vary in terms of engagement — props, percussion, hand motions, and movement. Preschoolers need to move, so be sure to give them opportunities that will allow them to be successful in your music class.
 - Consider whether the song can be re-purposed later in the year for a different holiday or theme.
- **Goodbye song/routine – the same each week**
 - With my toddlers and 2's classes, I have a puppy puppet who gives kisses during a goodbye song.
 - With my 2's, 3's and PK classes, we gather in a huddle with our hands on top of one another, count to three and then 'break,' saying SHALOM!

Change lyrics to suit your curriculum needs; make it a zipper song.
- **Put down the guitar!**
Lead sign language/gestures and rhythm activities; play a recording.
- **This is my FAVORITE part of the song!**

- This song has gone through many iterations since I first wrote it. This version has made the song so much more accessible to 2's and 3's.

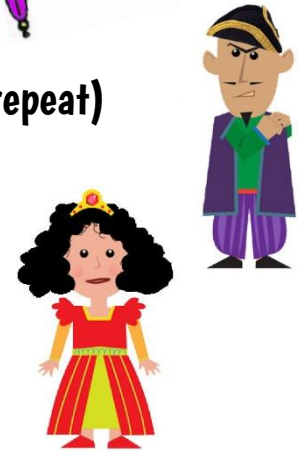

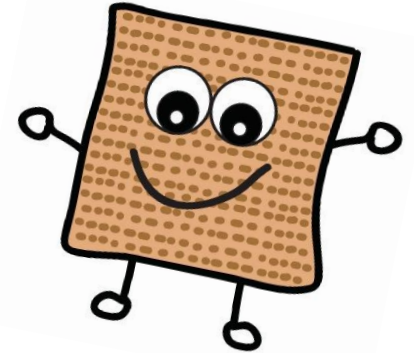

- Pat knees on the chorus, ending with hands outstretched as if to say 'where?'
- Give afikomen stick puppets to students and hide them behind your backs, under the carpet square, or even on top of your head!

Preschool Teaching Tips:

- This works nicely as an alternative to Building Cities with PK students or older.

For the verses: tap sticks together for the first and third lines of the verse, zip the sticks to chastise Pharaoh 'you know that slavery isn't right,' and bang the ground for 'Pharaoh let my people go!' with a final dramatic tap on 'GO!'

- Sticky and sweet - alternate taps on the floor 4x, followed by tapping sticks 3x
- Put them all together for a - tap floor 1x, tap 2x (repeat)
- Lag B'Omer treat – alternate taps on the floor 5x, followed by tapping sticks 1x
